TRUSTEES UPDATE

The Committee on Christian Education and Spiritual Formation and parents of young families originally discerned a need for our church to provide a safe and nearby space for parents to care for toddling kids, change diapers, nurse babies and still be a part of the worship life of our congregation. Through conversations with the Trustees and Church Coun-



cil, it was discerned that the Bridal Room (which has not been used for years) could be such a space. Thanks to the Trustees, money has been allocated and contractors have begun reconstruction of this space by taking out the side dividing walls, coat racks and old carpeting, and adding new lighting, fixing the heating system, adding a TV with closed circuit broadcast of our worship service, windows in each of the 4 doors that lead to the Family Room, a new diaper changing table, new electrical service and new carpeting. These renovations have been made to Safe Sanctuary and child safe compliance, so that our church can meet some of the needs of young families. Our hope is that this will be a nursery with adult supervision and nurture so that young parents can easily check on their kids if the parents wish to stay in worship, or spend time with their little or toddling ones and still be a part of the worship. We hope to have this new Family Room ready to be used in the near future.

(Recently, while the room, was under construction, we discovered a leak from the roof. We have patched the roof over the sanctuary for years and it is now time to completely resurface the flat roof that surrounds the sanctuary and Christian Education building.)

Thanks to the Trustees, light bulbs that have been out for over 15 years have been replaced. Some of the fixtures themselves no longer work, but those that do, now shine more light on the cross, the chancel and the pews in the sanctuary.






