### **SIMPSON SEMINARIANS**

At our Church Conference
Meeting on September 29,
2015, our congregation voted
unanimously to broaden the
visibility and language of the
Simpson Christian Education
Fund by establishing Simpson
Seminarians. These
seminarians from Drew
University Theological School,
who are taking the Supervised
Ministry Course will be eligible

to be Simpson Seminarians at the Chatham UMC. The Staff Parish Relations Committee who oversees the ministry needs of our Chatham UMC, with the input from the Senior Pastor, will identify seminarians who would like to be in a type of "apprenticeship" ministry here at Chatham UMC.

By establishing Simpson Seminarians, we will be able to honor some of the values of the Rev. Dr. Bob Simpson: a love for the Chatham UMC, Drew University Theological School, and the next generation of faithful Christian leadership. This will also allow us to become even more of a "Teaching Church" that encourages seminarians with opportunities to be in ministry, discover their spiritual and pastoral gifts, and learn from a highly functioning, nurturing and faithful United Methodist Church such as Chatham UMC. By building up this fund, it will also allow us to pay seminarians a small honorarium from the Simpson Christian Education Fund and take some pressure off of the general budget.

Bob and Megan Simpson's family has been very excited about this new ministry that honors Bob's ministry here at the Chatham UMC from 1965-1990, as well as his lifelong support of Drew University and its students. Above is a picture of Gwen Simpson Wear meeting our inaugural two Simpson Seminarians: Sooah Na and Seongsoo Kim, who are already actively in ministry at Chatham UMC, leading the liturgy at at 11:AM worship, working with our youth, praise band, Taizé services, participating in nursing home worship services, participating in the Congregational Care Ministry, and volunteering in mission projects.

Dear Friends,

Sir Laurence Olivier, one of the greatest Shakespearian actors of his time, once performed Hamlet. During the performance, he knew that something special was happening in his portrayal of Hamlet. Immediately after one of the greatest performance he had ever given, a friend found him backstage

weeping. Olivier's friend said, "You have just had the performance of your life! Why are you weeping?" Olivier said, "I know it was the performance of my life, but I don't know why!"

Sometimes after great experiences or great performances, it is helpful for us to ask ourselves "Why?" so that we can tap into this power, this ease, this way of being, more frequently.

At our last Church Council meeting, the leaders of Chatham UMC reflected on the success and fruitfulness of the recent capital campaign to renovate the sanctuary. We sensed our congregation accomplished something significant, beautiful and inspired. And so we asked ourselves why. What worked so well? How might we build on this and apply these dynamics to other great challenges facing our congregation and our world?

The Church Council identified some of what made this capital campaign so successful:

- We had good communication about the vision and the project.
- We deeply engaged a significant group of people for participation in the project.
- We reached out to many, who then invested in this vision.
- Generous people gave their financial support, including Dorothea Dier who left a significant gift of money to the Chatham UMC in her will.
- We built consensus, which was time well spent.
- We compromised well with each other, not insisting on our own way.
- Many were willing to give time and energy to this project.
- We had a reasonable and doable goal.
- We used endowment money judiciously.
- We were transparent about our plans, the project schedule and the work being done.
- It was an open process at every stage.
- The remaking of the pulpit honored the past, and yet moved us into the future.
- The project was accomplished with great sensitivity.
- We had a realistic timetable and stayed on task.
- We were flexible in worshiping in Rodda Hall during construction.
- We lived into this project with an adventuresome spirit.
- We tolerated tension and experienced "collegially challenge"
- We allowed folks to dissent, without judging, maligning, yet also kept moving forward, slowing the process when we discerned it necessary.
- We are now proud to host events like weddings knowing that our sanctuary is even more beautiful.

What would you add to this list?

Friends, perhaps this has always been part of the DNA of Chatham UMC. The above-mentioned sentiments can be core values for us as we respond to God's call, which at first usually seems impossible, overwhelming and too demanding. As the scripture says, "We can do all things through Christ who gives us strength." (Philippians 4:13.)

We held our service of blessing the new sanctuary on Sunday, October 11, 2015 moving throughout the sanctuary with singing, reading scriptures and praying words of blessing. You can see it on our Facebook page or website at: http://www.chathamumc.com/multimedia-archive/sanctuary-blessing/

Dear Friends.

Thanksgiving. One day a year, or a way of life? Our ability to experience and express gratitude can make all the difference. One writer puts it this way, "Gratitude may be the purest measure of one's character and spiritual condition."

As an expression of faith, gratitude - like other faith practices such as prayer, meditation, reading and studying the Bible, fasting, tithing - needs to be cultivated. Just as stewardship reflects our need to give back to God some of what God has given us, gratitude reflects our need to say thank you to God for all that God has given us, and done for us.

Here are a few ideas for cultivating the spiritual practice of gratitude:

- Trust that there is *always something* to be grateful for. No matter our circumstances, there are always *at least* two things to be grateful for. 1) God loves us. Each one of us. In ways beyond our ability to comprehend or imagine. Each one of us is God's unique, precious, beloved child. Perhaps you've noticed that when I pray with the children in worship, I almost always begin with, "thank you God, for loving us so much." 2) God is with us. Everywhere. Always. Rejoicing with us when we rejoice, weeping with us when we weep. We are always loved and we are never alone. Those are things to be grateful for!
- Stop, Look, and See we miss so much as we move through life at our often frantic pace. If we can pause, for just one minute we begin to notice things. The beauty and wonder of the world around us, the place we have to live, the clothes we have to wear, the people in our lives, and so on. Making a point of stopping for just sixty seconds each day to appreciate our blessings can help cultivate a sense of gratitude.
- Prayers before meals whether eating alone or with others, it's an obvious moment to say thank you not just for the food on your plate, but for all that was involved in getting it *to* your plate the people, the equipment, the weather conditions. Since eating is something we do usually more than once a day, saying thank you when we eat grows our sense of gratitude.
- All prayers every time you pray, make a point of saying thank you for something, someone.
- Praying the Psalms the book of Psalms is kind of like the prayer book or hymnal of ancient Israel. We find the full range of human emotions expressed in the psalms, and one of the most prevalent is gratitude. In your Bible reading at home, make a point of prayerfully reading a psalm each day, or the same psalm each day for a week and cultivate gratitude!
- Keep a Gratitude Journal every day write down five things for which you are grateful.

Remember the words of Susanna Wesley, mother of John and Charles Wesley: "Give God the praise for any well spent day." As you fall into bed each night – think back. Was this a well spent day – however you measure that? Give God thanks.

I encourage you to begin the practice of *ThanksLiving* – receiving and honoring each and every day as a gift from God; taking nothing and no one for granted. As you grow in ThanksLiving, just watch - you'll discover even more reasons to give thanks!




## Taizé Prayer Wednesday, November 11, 2015 7:30PM in the Asbury Room

This September, two new movies are being released, 90 Minutes in Heaven and A Walk in the Woods. Both are based on books in our library (Don Piper and Bill Bryson the respective authors).

The DVD collection now has four videos on the Wesleys and our Methodist heritage; the latest acquisition is *John Wesley – the Man and His Mission*. A new 6-hour PBS film, *Ancient Roads from Christ to Constantine*, follows Christianity's beginnings as "a small movement called 'The Way' to its eventual place as the official religion of the Roman Empire." *The Jewish People: A Story of Survival* (60 minutes) is also available for borrowing, as is Simon Schama's *The Story of the Jews* (5 hours)

## A Stewardship Moment Shared by Sally Strunc of the Stewardship Team on Sunday Morning, October 18, 2015

On September 29th, our congregation held its annual charge conference. It was attended by a group of perhaps 40 people, many of whom serve on various committees and occupy leadership positions in the church. We went through the annual report and discussed the latest committees and accomplishments of the past year and approved the new people appointed to the roster for 2016. We admired our revitalized sanctuary and felt energized by the wonderful things we are doing for the kingdom of God on earth through our pastors, seminary students, staff and programming.

Then we arrived at the budget for next year and many attendees were surprised to learn that even though we have been successful in our capital campaign for the sanctuary revitalization and have generated some additional revenue by increasing our income from property use by outside organizations such as the NJ Youth Chorus, we are still faced with a budget that anticipates a roughly \$100,000 deficit for 2016. This is in addition to the deficit for this year (2015), which was also in excess of \$100,000. These deficits are driven primarily by a drop in pledged and offering plate giving. As a result of these revelations and the need to approve large transfers from the 21st Century endowment fund in order to fund these deficits, we were asked, or I could say given a mandate by the charge conference, to provide more information and education regarding the finances of the church.

As we kick off the stewardship campaign, which traditionally takes place at this time of year, we on finance, stewardship and trustees are committed to this information sharing process. It is crucial for all of us to realize that the work of this church relies on a budget that is supported by regular giving each and every week by you the congregation. The running of this church is not a one off campaign to reach a one-time goal. It is a concerted effort over time to financially support the work of CUMC and it needs to be funded that way. Over the next couple of months through various communications including a presentation between services on November 15th, we on the stewardship committee will be rolling out a series of initiatives in order to better educate all of us as to how we can move towards a sustainable financial future for this church. The finance committee under Kevin Walker's leadership, the Stewardship committee under the leadership of Hal Burlingame and Susan Fountain and the Trustees, who are the guardians of the various endowment funds will be part of this transparent process. We plan to give everyone the information to make informed decisions regarding their contributions to the work of this church community, which provides such a wonderful, nurturing, Christian environment for all of us and our families.

In the meantime, please make every effort to fulfill your pledges for 2015 and consider an additional yearend gift to help us to close the sizable gap which currently exists between expected and received revenue for 2015.

### Welcome to the Chatham United Methodist Church

Built in the early 1960s, the sanctuary of the Chatham United Methodist church is designed in the mid-century modern, "A" frame style. Consistent with most of the mid-century modern structures of the time, the sanctuary is an American reflection of the Bauhaus and International design movements.


Characteristic of the style, the space is defined by straight lines and angular shapes declaring that this is the work of man during a forward-thinking time. However, combined with the angular design elements is the liberal use of organic materials that provide a clear connection to the natural world – rows of pine planks lining the ceiling, solid maple pews, interconnected wood beams acting as both backdrop to the chancel area and encasement to the pipes of our spectacular organ; and a rough-hewn cross as the point of central focus.

Also characteristic of the mid-century modern style is an abundance of natural light illuminating the sanctuary through a wall of windows at the rear and our beautiful stained glass windows along both sides. This warm wash of sunlight serves to marry both the manmade and organic elements of the space and is a component integral to the structure and its life as both a modernist "home" to the congregation and a true "house" of God.

In 2015 the sanctuary underwent a comprehensive renovation that honored the modernist structure by holding true to its representative themes, while also expanding upon them. The carpet chosen for the space is designed with uneven linear elements that usher the congregation toward the chancel and altar, in an organic sand-green color that brings to mind the additional organic element of flowing water. The hardwood used in the chancel area was chosen for its strong, characteristic grain that emphasizes its organic nature and also helps to unify the many wood colors present in the sanctuary. Finally, new interior windows at the rear allow for an even greater wash of comforting sunlight.

Welcome to the Chatham United Methodist Church - a modernist masterpiece with an eye to the future, that honors the beauty of the natural world and pays ultimate homage to the glory of God.
