"It is not about becoming spiritual beings nearly as much as about becoming simple human beings. The biblical revelation is saying that we are already spiritual beings, but we just don't know it yet. The Bible tries to let you in on the secret, by revealing God in the ordinary, and in the seemingly tragic. That's why so much of the text seems so mundane, practical, specific and, frankly, unspiritual!

We have created a terrible kind of dualism between the spiritual and the so-called non-spiritual. This dualism precisely is what Jesus came to reveal as a lie. The principle of Incarnation proclaims that matter and spirit have never been separate. Jesus came to tell us that these two seemingly different worlds are and always have been one. We just couldn't see it until God put them together in his one body (see Ephesians 2:11-20)."

Dear Friends,

It is so important for Christians to have community in which we can delve into the mystery and ramifications of the Incarnation of God in Jesus Christ. It is beyond us, and vet what glimpse we are given, can change everything.

In the next few weeks, our culture will tell us that we don't have enough decorations, gifts, parties, activities, food, drink and distractions. I hope to enjoy some of all of these things, but not at the expense of missing the meaning of Advent, and the reminder of God's desire to be with us in Jesus. I hope that we can spend the Sundays in Advent worshiping God together. I hope that we can be involved in Advent Small Groups that will discuss our faith, our questions, and the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. I also hope that we can worship God together on that holy night we know as Christmas Eve.

Throughout the Northeast, fewer and fewer people have been coming out to the late Christmas Eve services. Some have family visiting from out of town, some are traveling, some don't like to drive late at night, and some are grateful for services earlier in the evening. Over the past year, the Covenant Choir, the Bell Choir, the Chatham UMC Church Council, the Worship Committee and the staff were asked to pray about a new worship schedule on Christmas Eve. Over the past few months, our discernment became clear. Chatham UMC will offer a 5PM Family Friendly Christmas Eve Service, when we will tell the story of the Nativity, sing Christmas Carols, hear a message, say prayers and sing Silent Night to candle-light. Our other service will be the 8PM Traditional Service of Lessons and Carols, when scriptures will be read, interspersed with sacred music and Christmas Carols, culminating in Silent Night by candle-light.

Both services will be sacred and holy in their own way. I hope you can come to one or both of services so that together we might gaze into the mystery of the Incarnation, and discover again God's deep desire to be in loving relationship with the whole world.



Join Chatham UMC for a continuing season of music for the spirit and soul!





Homeless Solutions, Morristown, NJ:

This year CUMC has named Morristown-based Homeless Solutions as the local recipient to our Christmas Giving. This organization's motto is "A Hand Up, Not A Hand Out." Founded in 1983, and originally named Morris Shelter, Inc., this worthy organization provided beds and hot meals to men in the Manse of the Presbyterian Church in Morristown. Recently Homeless Solutions added Furnishing Solutions, located at 2060 Route 10 West, in Morris Plains. There you may drop off gently used furnishings, home décor, clothing and accessories. They provide free pick up if you call 973-998-0322 or go to www.furnishingsolutions.org.

In addition to monetary donations, Homeless Solutions has a wish list of the following items which may be donated at the White Gifts Epiphany Service in January.

- * cold breakfast cereal, * antibacterial soap, * toilet paper,
- * facial tissues, * paper towels, * twin sheets and blankets

Over the past five years, CUMC has donated over \$5,000 to this worthy organization. Here's how those dollars have helped: \$12 provides a "Welcome Basket" of toiletries & shower shoes for a new guest at the shelter. \$30 provides milk for children at the shelter for one week \$50 provides new bedding for a shelter guest \$80 fills the tank of an HIS van which provides shelter guests transportation to and from childcare and work \$130 provides shelter for a family for one night

Faith Community Health Partnerships

Health is a good that we wish for ourselves, our families, and our communities. We are aware that achieving and maintaining health requires that we pay attention to our nutrition, exercise, and a host of other things. But what may come as a surprise to many is that the services of healthcare providers contribute only about 10% of the factors that support our health. The remaining 90% of health factors originate in our community including participation in a religious community.

Food Stamp Crisis in New Jersey hurts our families

When our families come out of shelter to permanent housing, food stamps are typically key to their strategy for maintaining financial self-sufficiency. The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), aka Food Stamps, is funded nationally, but administered at the state and county levels. The financial crisis exposed woeful inadequacies in the administration of the program in NJ, where a 42% surge in applicants swamped the system. NJ now ranks close to the bottom of all states in processing applications timely. Lack of focus at the state level, along with outdated technology and understaffing at the county level, delay benefits to qualifying families by months. Many applications are lost altogether. One out of 10 people in NJ receive food stamps, but many more qualify, either waiting for stalled benefits, or overlooked by lackluster outreach. The crisis is exacerbated by the 2014 Farm Bill's \$8.6 B reduction in SNAP funding, (over 10 years), reducing benefits by \$36 per month for a family of four.

Steps are being taken to address the problem, but it will take time. As a result, many of our families leaving shelter simply do not have enough food. Food banks are open, but as we know, they don't have enough food either, and are often already figured into the families' plans for making ends meet. The reality is that "supplemental nutrition" is in fact "basic nutrition" for many.

Family Promise continues to nurture and support families long after they move into permanent housing. To address the food stamp crisis in the immediate, they have entered into partnership with **Jolin Food Box**, an outreach program of **Jolin Foods** that provides nutritious meals for our families at wholesale prices. Jolin is a long-standing supplier of quality frozen, grocery and refrigerated foods to grocery stores. The products in their "food boxes" contain a balanced variety of breakfast, lunch and dinner items, prepackaged in Jolin's temperature controlled warehouse, including meats, seafood, vegetables, potatoes, and desserts.

Supporters are helping Family Promise with donations to purchase boxes, which provide anywhere from 13 to 37 meals at a cost of \$.76 to \$1.47 per meal. Church and Society has contributed \$100 from our family promise ministry funds for immediate purchase of food boxes. Through varied and positive experiences, our goal at MMO is to help children grow.


