Dear Friends

For my birthday a few years ago, my friend Michael Christensen brought me to a U2 Concert at Giant's stadium. Michael and I have been U2 fans for decades. They are one of the most successful and socially conscious bands in this history of Rock and Roll, and also committed followers of Jesus. One of the highlights of the concert was to sing along with 80,000 to the above lyrics, “but I still haven't found what I'm looking for.” It was as tangible an expression of human longing, holy longing, and spiritual hunger as I have experience with such a large crowd. The youth of the Chatham UMC will be singing this song on the Fourth Sunday of Advent on December 20 at the 9:am worship service. This is poignant during the season of Advent. We know that Christ has come, yet we long for his coming again. We have chosen in life to follow Jesus, yet there is still an occasional restlessness that can only be satisfied by encounter with the living God. We are on the journey but have not yet fully arrived. To quote Augustine, 3rd Century Christian, “Our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee.”

Come to worship on Sundays in December. Come to Taize Prayer on December 9 at 7:30PM. Come to Christmas Eve Services at 5:00PM and 8:00PM. Come to New Years Eve Watch Night Service. Come to small groups that are meeting during Advent. Come to the Alternative Gift Fair on December 6 from 10:AM-12:30PM. You might catch a glimpse of what you are looking for, or perhaps catch a glimpse of the One, you are looking for.

It is in these holy days when we sing of the One described in the hymnal:

“The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.”

May our Advent be Holy, and may our holy longing be fulfilled.

Dear Friends,

The church's season of Advent is upon us! Advent is beautifully summed up in Charles Wesley's hymn we often sing at this time: "Come, thou long-expected Jesus." Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas and lasts through sunset Christmas Eve. How wise were our forbears in the faith, recognizing that we need time to prepare for that most wondrous of events – God made human in the birth of Jesus. For Christians, Advent is a time of two expectations, neither of which is the sort felt by the secular world. Not the expectation of celebration, presents, and feasting, but rather the expectation of the simple yet extraordinary birth of a baby to a poor couple far from home. A baby who would change the world as none other. Our second Advent expectation is that the Christ born as that baby will one day return to earth to "bring an end to all that is contrary to the ways of God."

Our Christian forbears also showed wisdom in acknowledging that we need more than **one day** to celebrate Christmas. For the church, Christmas is not just a day, but a **season of twelve days!** The season begins on Christmas Day and ends on Epiphany, January 6, with the celebration of the arrival of the Magi. Thus, the Twelve Days of Christmas. Try and celebrate the birth of Christ in a simple but special way on each of the twelve days – have fun, use your creativity, and see if it doesn't make your Christmas celebration even more joyous and meaningful.

And speaking of celebrating the birth – "Whose birthday is it, anyway?" One prominent United Methodist pastor challenges us to "Quit acting like Christmas is YOUR birthday!" Isn't that the truth? In so many ways Christmas ends up seeming a lot more like OUR birthdays than Jesus'. This pastor also recounts an incident from the first time he challenged his congregation to give the same amount of money to Christ's work in the world as the amount they spent on Christmas gifts. One congregant had already booked a cruise for his entire family for Christmas. One of his young children held him accountable to the Pastor's challenge, and he ended up doing just that to the tune of thousands of dollars! What do you think - could God be calling us to follow the same principle? However we do it, let's remind ourselves and the rest of the world, "Whose birthday is it, anyway?"

May you know the *true* blessings of Advent and Christmas –

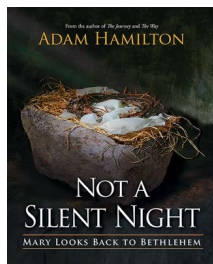
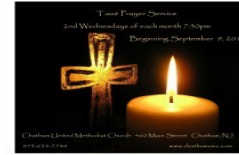
SPIRITUAL FORMATION

Amiens, became a metaphor for a longer spiritual pilgrimage. In the last 20 years, labyrinthine spirituality has captured the attention and spiritual hunger of mainline Protestants and seekers throughout the US. In fact there are many churches that open their doors and labyrinths to visitors and pilgrims who wish to walk, and pray, and seek.

We will meet at the Chatham UMC at 10:AM for a brief time of devotions and spiritual preparation. We will then carpool to Christ Church where we can together walk and seek communion with God. Dress warm! Friends and seekers are most welcome to join us. We'll go out for lunch after our labyrinth walk to enjoy the community that the Holy Spirit will certainly create.

Our fall season of music at Chatham UMC has been in full swing and as we enter the season of Advent we will continue with beautiful music! During the month of December, the Praise Band will lead music for the 9:00 a.m. service on Sunday, December 6th, the Covenant Choir will perform special music with the Wesley Ringers on Sunday, December 13th for both services, and the Youth Musicians will perform for the 9:00 a.m. service on Sunday, December 22nd. For our Christmas Eve services on Thursday, December 24th, our Youth Musicians will lead the family-friendly service at 5:00 p.m. and the Covenant Choir with Sooh Na as soloist and Ron Yarger on Flute will lead music for the 8:00 p.m. service of lessons and carols. Come and hear our fantastic music leaders of the congregation throughout

December and for our Christmas Eve services!

This program season I have been talking to our musicians about a question: "how do you find the sacred in the secular?" As Pastor Jeff and I have been thinking about growing our congregation and reaching out to the community around us, I have been thinking about growing our canon of sacred music. A canon is a group of pieces that have meaning. And our canon of sacred music that we sing and perform in our sanctuary can grow and expand to include new music. Our Youth Musicians have been begun talking about popular songs in which they find the sacred and holy. I have also spoken to our adult musicians and the church council and we have discussed how this question can help us, as members of a Christian community, understand what the holy and sacred means for us in our world today. I invite you, as members of the

congregation, to listen to music, both sacred and secular, both in our sanctuary and outside it, absorb the text, and ask: "what about this music makes me understand the sacred and feel the holy?" Music is a medium in which we can "hear" many things: emotions, ideas, as well as our thoughts about God and how we fit in this church community and our world. Thinking about the music that we sing in our sanctuary is as important as how we sing it. As we continue our program season and enter the Spring, you will hear our musicians perform pieces that will be meaningful to us; I believe that you will "hear" the meaning for you as well.
