Dear Friends,

The Lenten Season always begins with the lectionary text on Ash Wednesday from Matthew 6:1-6. Jesus gives us some guiding values and encouragement in the spiritual life. He encourages us to not care as much about what we look like, what people think of us, or say about us. He encourages us to go into our room, close the door, and seek God in secret, trusting that God will bless us in that secret place. Jesus is reminding us that our primary relationship is with God. When we intentionally focus on our primary relationship, then all of our secondary relationships, (everyone and everything else!) fall into place. When our connection with God's love is strong, then love flows to us, in us and through us.

Chatham UMC is offering many opportunities to grow in our experiences of prayer. The book <u>Listen: Praying in a Noisy World</u> by Rueben Job is for sale in the church office. Small groups will be meeting to discuss the book and DVD as well as explore different ways of praying. Every Wednesday at 7PM we'll be offering a Taizé Prayer in the sanctuary. This is an ancient way of prayer, inspired by the early Christians, and practiced by millions of Christians from very many denominations throughout the world today. Sunday morning worship will offer various opportunities to pray through song, written word, Centering Prayer and silence. But this is not enough. Jesus teaches the disciples and us to seek God when we are all alone, trusting that this may be when we are our truest selves. We are our most true selves, when we are silent, and THIS is the part of us that God loves and delights in the most...our truest and most authentic selves.

May God bless us as a congregation and as disciples, as we grow deeper in our understanding and practice of the mystery of prayer. I wish you a Holy Lent.

Greetings:

At the January Church Council meeting, we began a conversation over the Trustees' proposed sanctuary renovations and the related capital campaign that's being formulated. There are concerns over asking for extra funds from congregants when we're still falling short on our operating expenses. At the same time, there is a feeling that the run-down physical condition of our sanctuary calls for an investment; this may be the first impression visitors and potential new members have of our church and we want it to reflect our vibrant and inviting community. While these are not necessarily contradictory views, we do need a constructive dialogue to arrive at the best possible approach for this moment. This is a question rooted in our financial reality, but intertwined with our vision for CUMC's future, and it's a conversation too sweeping and involved to adequately engage in the course of a regular Church Council meeting.

So at this month's meeting, we set a date for a separate meeting to have this discussion. At that time, we'll also need to vote on whether or not to approve a fundraising effort led by the Trustees. We've decided <u>on Saturday, March 7, at 1:00 p.m.</u>. While only members of Church Council may vote on the eventual proposal, please note that Church Council meetings—including this one—are open and all are welcome to attend and participate in the discussion.



<u>Listen—Praying in a Noisy World</u>

We live in a world of noise. Everywhere we go, we hear sounds that compete for our minds and hearts. Listening to God requires a deliberate choice to shut out the chaos around us and focus our thoughts.

During Lent, small groups will be working with Listen—Praying in a Noisy World, by Rueben P. Job, a 40-day experience created to offer help to those new to prayer, those with a daily prayer routine, and those whose lives seem too busy to pray. With a focus on listening prayer and prayer as a two-way conversation, the book and DVD assist individuals

and groups in building and deepening a personal prayer practice and spiritual discernment.

As we learn to listen, we find a new depth and fulfillment in our relationship with God and a new experience of God as guide and companion in our lives. The daily prayer pattern includes an invitation, silence, Bible reading, a story, guided time for reflecting and listening, and practical help for developing six specific prayer practices.

TRUSTEES UPDATE

NOTES FROM THE TRUSTEES

Our church is blessed with an extraordinarily beautiful church building and worship space. Our Trustees are charged with maintaining and enhancing our building to best serve our members and attract new members to grow and revitalize our church. The Trustees work very hard to carry out our charge. We want communication between the congregation and Trustees to be open. This article is the first of a series planned to broaden member/trustee communication.

Following is a summary highlighting a few of the Trustees' ongoing projects:

- 1. **Roof Repair** Necessary reroofing of the flat u-shaped roof around the sanctuary and repairing the roof over the lower flat-roofed section of the church started in January. The work has been suspended due to the weather and will resume as soon as weather permits.
- 2. <u>Family Room</u> The former Bride's Room off the narthex is being renovated into a Family Room so that, if they wish, parents with small children may have a comfortable place to be together for all or part of the service while still participating in the service. There will be a 40-inch TV to monitor the service, a baby-changing table, a sofa and some chairs, and toys for the children. The door will have glass panels in keeping with the "safe sanctuary" requirements. Work remaining to be done includes installation of a wall heating/fan unit. Target for completion is the first of April.
- 3. <u>Sanctuary Refurbishment</u> It has been many years since we have spent any money at all on capital improvements and some parts of the sanctuary have fallen into disrepair. Advances in lighting and church design are available to improve and al-

low more flexibility in worship experience. The Trustees have spent quite a lot of time considering what should be done at this time. We have been consulting with a church architect and carpet design experts. A generous family has offered a substantial gift toward new carpet, and we have set up a congregation/trustee committee to look into additional funding. You will hear more about the project in the coming months. The architect will join us between services on March 15 to give everyone an opportunity to ask questions and see drawings.

If you have questions for us, the current Trustees are Anne Fullarton (Chair), Tom Fountain (Vice Chair), Eleanor Hartley (Secretary), Tom Belding, Claudia Couch, Tom Harrison, Dave Meyer, Nick Sfiris, and Rich Tomasello.

Church Council Update February 16 Meeting

Spiritual Vitality for a Healthy Church:

Our church will become a more vital congregation as we are able to speak freely with each other about where in the church, our lives, and the world the Holy Spirit is at work.

Additionally, vital congregations meet in small groups to explore their faith together and work together in small group ministries to strengthen their connections to each other and the outside world. All members of the Council are encouraged to join a Lenten Study Group to grow in our understanding of prayer. The more we pray the more doors open to the Holy Spirit and this will bring peace and a source of love to our church.

Rally Day: The Council has decided that going forward the date for Rally day will officially be the first Sunday after Labor Day. Programming for Rally Day 2015 is in place.

Music Report: Peter has Easter Services planned and is working with all of our musicians to prepare for Palm Sunday, Maundy Sunday, and Easter Sunday services.

The Canticle of Life Concert plans are moving forward. Sponsorships are available for \$60 and your committee will be highlighted in the program. The end of the music season will be

on June 14, and will be celebrated with a Music and Arts Appreciation Sunday.

The Taize prayer service will begin at 7:00pm and last about 45 min. Volunteer soup cooks should contact Karen Berry.

In April, the evening will begin at 7:00pm with a conversation with the Brothers and then a prayer service in the Sanctuary which should conclude around 9pm. More details to follow as plans develop.

COMING FULL CIRCLE!

Canticles for Life AIDS Benefit Concert Saturday, April 18 at 4:00pm

"...Whatsoever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

Matthew 25:40

This is the ministry of the *Canticles for Life* AIDS Benefit Concerts. In 1997 the very first *Canticles* concert was presented at the Chatham United Methodist Church. The congregation is very pleased that the *Canticles for Life* concerts will return to CUMC with a performance on Saturday, April 18th at 4:00 p.m. Presented by Triad Arts Ensemble in partnership with CUMC, this music ministry directly benefits three New Jersey organizations that support those impacted by HIV/AIDS and in memory of those lost to the disease. The concerts also raise awareness, dispel ignorance, and help to shine God's love through the compassion, talents, and financial gifts of those attending and performing.

Canticles Chairperson, Ginny Johnston of Maplewood, will conduct the 30-voice **Triad Vocal Ensemble**, featuring a mix of styles including accessible anthems, Gospel, and an inspiring setting of *Make Me An Instrument* by New Jersey composer and past CUMC Music Director, Mark Miller. The concerts will also feature **The Dan Crisci Jazz Trio** performing standards and Dan's original compositions. Rounding out the program will be the electrifying vocalists, **Kirsten Egan and Nina Elias**, sharing a variety of Broadway and cabaret selections. In the church sanctuary, panels from the AIDS Memorial Quilt will be on display and a new Memorial Panel will be dedicated during a time of prayer and reflection. A reception will follow the concert in Rodda Hall.

Tickets are \$15 for general admission, \$12 for students and seniors, \$25 for a contributor ticket and \$60 for a Program Sponsor (which includes 2 tickets and a one-line message in the program). Tickets can be purchased online at www.CanticlesforLife.org, in person through the church, by mailing the completed flyer/order form, or at the door the day of the concert. Pick up a flyer/order form from the church office or visit the Canticles web site for further information.

The *Canticles* concerts benefit these charities that care for the quality of life for persons living with HIV/AIDS and the remembrance of lives lost: **New Jersey AIDS Services** based in Morristown, the **NAMES Project of Northern NJ** supporting the AIDS Memorial Quilt, and the **AIDS Resource Foundation for Children** in Newark. Over \$115,000 has been raised for the New Jersey AIDS charities. The *Canticles for Life* **AIDS Benefit Concerts** have been held almost annually since 1997 and have featured dozens of pieces by New Jersey composers.



CUMC Family Promise Update—by Claudia Shaw

Our 2015 hospitality ministry to our families will begin in April when we welcome our first group of guests for a week's stay at our church. In gearing up for their visit, a few CUMC volunteers attended the training session held each month for volunteers in Morris County.

The focus of the day's discussion was to help us better understand the mindset and feelings of our guests, as well as to share experiences and best practices. One exercise that was particularly thought provoking had us review our basic living skills to identify the socioeconomic group where our skills were most aligned.

It was not a surprise to learn that I had mostly middle class skills. For example, I know how to do on-line checking, I know how to help my children with their homework, and if I need additional information, I know how to call the school; I know how to sign my children up for recreational sports.

It was, however, eye opening to realize that there is a whole group of skills that I do not have — I don't know how to maneuver through poverty. For example, I wouldn't know how to file for unemployment or food stamps; I don't know how to get along without a car in the suburbs; I don't know all the places where I can get a free meal, or the location of free medical clinics; I don't know which judges in my community are lenient, which ones are crooked, and which ones are fair. Of course, I'm confident that I could learn these things. But what would it be like if I had to learn them all at once — to learn a whole different way of life?

Thinking about the context in which our guests are skilled and I am ignorant inspires my admiration for what they take on by embracing the goal of self- sufficiency, which is required by the Family Promise Program. They exemplify what Jesus taught about the poor being blessed, and the humble being exalted. It is an honor to serve them.

Please consider helping out during the upcoming host week – April 19 through April 26. There are many volunteer opportunities – some involve interacting with the guests, others do not. There will be a sign-up closer to that time, and meanwhile please call with any questions to Claudia Shaw.

FEINSTEIN TIME AGAIN!!

YOUR EFFORTS AND SUPPORT MAKE A DIFFERENCE!!



This year it has become ever more critical for CUMAC to have a successful food and monetary collection through the Feinstein Challenge. They currently are feeding **over 4,000 people a month**, up significantly from last year. Not only will they need

every dollar "earned" through large food collections, but this is their opportunity to stock up for the many difficult months ahead.

Currently unemployment rates are hovering at almost 7% in NJ. For those who can find a job, they're working fewer hours or getting paid less than they were a few years ago. Factor in the rising cost of living and cuts in government aid, and making ends meet becomes difficult. And with more cuts coming to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), things will get tougher.

Chatham United Methodist Church has always supported CUMAC's efforts with the Feinstein Challenge during the months of March and April. Every dollar and pound of food collected during those months will count toward philanthropist Alan Shawn Feinstein's challenge grant program. His goal has been to use the Challenge as a way to raise awareness of hunger in communities by dividing \$1 million among hunger agencies who collect the largest amounts of food by weight.

In **2014** Chatham Methodist Church provided **1,047 pounds** toward the nearly 278,324 pounds of food CUMAC received through contributions from churches and individuals. (Our contribution in **2013 was 1,630 pounds**.) Additionally, CUMAC raised \$187,762 which helped helped them to keep up with part of the summer's high demand during the lean "giving" months. This contributed to CUMAC being awarded the second largest grant in NJ from the Feinstein Foundation
