Haggai 1:3-4 (From The Living Bible)

Dear Friends,

This somewhat obscure text from the Bible comes from the Prophet Haggai who called the people of Israel to account for living in finely furnished, new houses, while the Temple of the Lord lay in ruins.

I am thankful that our church building is not in ruins. Countless generations of Trustees and generous United Methodists in Chatham have cared well for our facilities and the ministries that flow out of our church. I am also grateful for the positive response that so many of you have given to the presentations and vision of renovating our sanctuary. The Trustees and Fundraising Team have presented the vision for this renovation with great clarity of purpose and tangible ways that our congregation members can support this effort. Thank you in advance to those of you who have or will contribute to this effort.

I want to also ask for your prayers for the Trustees and our congregation as we move forward into the building phase. I understand why it is so difficult for the people of Israel, or any congregation that works on a building improvement. When we improve our own houses, it is relatively easy to make a decision between one or two adults in the home. It is another dynamic all together when 9 Trustees, 20+ leaders in the Church Council, and a congregation have to agree on physical improvements to our holiest of spaces. This can often be ground to a halt because it is so hard to find consensus.

Please pray for one another as we live into these renovations in our sanctuary. Please pray for those who may have a different taste in carpet color than you do. Please pray for those who may agree or disagree with you about the size of the pulpit. Please pray for those who can't imagine changing the chancel to engineered hard word, and those who look forward to the better acoustics.

I am thankful that we will be able to worship God in spirit and in truth, in a beautiful sanctuary for many years to come. I am also thankful that wherever two or more are gathered in the name of Christ, (whether they are of the same mind or not) Christ is there, loving us, delighting in the community that forms, and calling us to reach out with compassion to a world longing for hope and love.

On a cold March evening, nine CUMC members along with Pastor Sharon attended the first Faith Community Health Partnership (FCHP) training session at Morristown Medical Center, led by the Rev. Dr. Gary Myers. The session included information about the components of the FCHP program and the role of FCHP Liaisons. A Liaison or Congregational Care Minister (CCM) is an active par-

ticipant in CUMC who is gifted, called, and trained to journey alongside persons in our congregation and their families before (if possible), during, and after a time of hospitalization. Congregational Care Ministry does not replace the hospital visitation role of the pastors, but rather supplements it. It makes it possible for us to grow in our faithfulness to our Christian calling to care for one another, and it enables us to take to the next level the quality of the care we offer to those in our church family experiencing hospitalization.

Watch for updates as we move toward implementing this ministry of the Holy Spirit among us! We will commission our Congregational Care Ministers during both worship services on Sunday, May 31.

From Behind the Reredos!

A talk with Yang-Hee Song, our Organist and Accompanist

It's been wonderful getting to know people in the congregation over this season at Chatham UMC. In addition to you, the congregation, I also want to get to know someone a little bit more who has been at my side since I started here at CUMC: Yang-Hee Song. She is my and the choir's right ...and left! hands every Sunday. You hear her fantastic work at the organ and piano in both Sunday services as she faithfully brings to life hymns, psalms and spiritual songs! If you get a chance, find Yang-Hee behind the reredos (the wooden

screen behind the altar) and tell her what a wonderful job she does every week!


Yang-Hee was born in Daegu City, South Korea and always wanted to be a musician. She came to the United States to study at the Juilliard School in NYC for her master's degree in organ performance. While there, she was a student of the noted organist, John Weaver. She fondly recalls going to performances at the Metropolitan Opera and being able to work with many world class students. Yang-Hee became good friends with her roommate at school who was a soprano; so much so, that they toured the Southern states of the U.S. as a duo!

After graduating, Yang-Hee moved to New Jersey and it was our good luck that she applied to the church's position as organist! By August 2015, she will have been organist at UMC for 16 years. Of her time here, she fondly remembers the organ recital she gave in 2009 to rededicate the organ after being refurbished. She appreciated Tom Kitson who got the word out to the congregation; it was very well attended! Yang-Hee also remembers the support from members of the congregation and the choir especially Nan and Dale Canfield who have helped her many times over the years.

In August of this year, Yang-Hee will spend the month in Korea and getting married in her home town, in the church in which her father is an elder. Her fiancé is Joon Kim and they met while she was a golf student of Joon's. Golf brought them together, but music does also: last summer they sang a duet during a summer worship; and after *this* summer they will have many more opportunities to sing together.

When not at the church or playing golf with Joon, Yang-Hee maintains a very active private piano studio of 30 students. She enjoys teaching young students, seeing them grow up learning music theory, performing, and feeling accomplished as they become young adults. Recently four students competed at a piano competition; two of them won spots in a recital at Carnegie Hall!

We hope that Yang-Hee spends many more years here at Chatham UMC. If you would like to hear her students perform they will be giving a recital here at the church on Saturday, May 30th 3:00 p.m. Yang-Hee also plans on performing a solo organ recital in the fall following the sanctuary revitalization. How Hungry is America?

One in Six Households Report Inability to Afford Enough Food, Survey Finds

The Food Research & Action Center (FRAC) released in April <u>"How Hungry is</u> <u>America?</u>" its latest look at Gallup survey data on food hardship. This report reviews 2014 data for the nation, every state, and 100 of the country's largest MSA's (Metropolitan Statistical Areas). Here are five things you should know.

- 1. One in six American households (17.2 percent) said in 2014 that there had been times over the past 12 months that they didn't have enough money to buy food that they or their families needed.
- 2. What that means the economy is improving, but tens of millions of people are still struggling to afford the basics.
- 3. There's not one state that is free from hunger. Even the "best" state on the report's Food Hardship Index, North Dakota, has one in eleven households struggling to afford enough food. Nine states have more than one in five households struggling.
- 4. Such high food hardship rates are unacceptable, yet some in Congress continue to propose huge cuts to proven and effective programs, such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), school meals programs, and other supports.
- 5. What you can do: Tell your Members of Congress that you want them to solve hunger by strengthening our nation's safety net. Oppose efforts to cut nutrition programs. Add your name today to the <u>Support SNAP petition</u>.

TRUSTEES UPDATE

NOTES FROM THE TRUSTEES

Following is a brief update on some of the Trustees' ongoing projects:

- 1. Sanctuary Revitalization The Capital Campaign is underway! As of April 8 more than \$36,000 in payments and pledges have been received toward our \$84,000 campaign goal. We are very grateful to those who have so quickly and generously responded. You will be hearing more from the Sanctuary Revitalization Campaign Committee, and you can monitor the progress of the campaign by looking at the display in the hallway to the sanctuary. Donations can now be made online at our website, chathamumc.com, by clicking the Make Donation link and choosing the Sanctuary Revitalization line.
- **2. Roof Repair** Roof repair should be done by the time you read this. One more day of good weather is needed to install the skylights and complete the work.
- **3. Family Room** The Family Room off the narthex is already being used! It was exciting to see some families there Easter morning watching the service on the closed circuit monitor. Furniture has been purchased and should be installed soon, as well as a heating/airconditioning unit. Carpet will be added when the sanctuary carpet is installed.
- 4. Narthex New narthex lights have been purchased and we are working with an electrician to update the wiring. The ceiling will then be patched and painted and the electrician will return to install the lights.
- **5. Windows** New windows will be installed in the wall between the narthex and the sanctuary in order to allow more light, transparency and welcome.




